In the meantime, controllers, planners and organisers should be aware of potential hazards to people attending an event, and make sure that people are made aware of these hazards e.g. by way of notices at the caravan or during a briefing.

Ben and Jackie have been travelling through British Columbia and Alberta in Canada, and are about to venture over to the east coast. In our travels we have seen and heard of (but haven't actually been able to make it to) some interesting orienteering events and

courses. However, we have devised a new form of orienteering for the people of Calgary. We are not sure if this event has been staged before but we thought we would introduce DOC to it anyway, for future use as a competitive event (although it may mean travelling to Calgary as we can't think of anywhere near Dunedin where it could be held). It all started with the street names here - 1st Avenue SW, 1st Street SE, 4th Avenue SW and SE, 5th Avenue and Street SE and SW - and this is just in the downtown area - we're too scared to venture further as we may really get lost! We have a small northern hemisphere compass my uncle bought at a coffee store in London (he thought it may come in handy over here) and we have used it. The streets are OK after a while, but the thing with Calgary is that in winter it gets really really cold, so being soft as they are they decided not to go outside. They have linked all of the downtown shopping and office buildings using overground walkways - not just like a normal walkway, but 15 km of walkway!!! Going from one shopping area to another with no natural landmarks to use, and a limited city map, and our amazing coffee store compass we decided that it would make a great event. We were orienting our map and using our fantastic sense of direction, but the escalators threw us off so we decided the event should be called "3D Mall-O". It would be great fun. Finding hidden passageways between stores, locating the escalator going the direction you want, with plenty of drink stations, and as many washrooms (oops, sorry about that - toilets!!) as you may want (no more digging holes). We think it could catch on.

We may actually make it to a few events over here (we visited MapTown today - a fantastic store) and give it a go, rather than just inventing events. It made an interesting twist to our shopping!
